Physiognomic Omens in the Gārgīyajyotiṣa

This lecture seeks to present an overview of the physiognomic material from a single chapter, divided into two sections, corresponding to the strīlaksana, "marks of women," and the purusalaksana, "marks of men." The chapter begins with the latter, followed by the former, without a clear separation between the two and occurs rather late in the Jyotisa-compilation, called the *Gārgīyajyotisa*, which is not to be confused with the late purānic Gargasamhitā. The work is found only in manuscripts, so investigation is still at its infancy. Nevertheless, Pingree (based on Mitchiner) claims it to be the earliest extant Jyotisa-compilation, dating from around the 1<sup>st</sup> cent. C.E. He further speculates that it could well contain elements that connect it with similar types of systems of divination and their literature coming from the Greekspeaking world, such as does the Yavanajātaka of Sphujidhvaja. Therefore, this lecture will also pay attention to possible similarities to older and more-western forms of physiognomy found in ancient Mesopotamia and ancient Greece.
